- We'll have a neighbour we can trust and turn to in the event of an emergency.

Meet Your Local Police Force

Connecting with your local police force is another way to make your community safer and more secure. You can find your local police force at [police.uk](#), along with crime prevention tips and resources, statistics, and guidance for seeking support in the event you're affected by crime. You might also consider engaging with your local police force on social media.

Prevent Residential Road Accidents

According to the [Warwickshire Road Safety Partnership](#), speeding, driving while under the influence of drugs or alcohol, distracted driving, and operating a motor vehicle without fastening a seatbelt are four of the most common causes of motor vehicle injuries and fatalities. However, there are several steps you can take to prevent road accidents in your community. These include:

- Forming a [Community Speed Watch](#) (CSW) group in your area.
- Submitting video footage of traffic offences to your local police force.
- Brushing up on your driving skills every few years and encouraging neighbours to do the same.

Improve Your Home's Safety and Security

In addition to joining the Neighbourhood Watch, connecting with your local police force, and taking steps to prevent residential road accidents, there are some things you can do to outsmart burglars and improve your home's security.

As a few examples, be sure to keep your blinds and windows closed in the evening, install a security camera and/or video doorbell, and plant defensive shrubs around your home. Firethorn,

Crataegus Monogyna, and Ilex Aquifolium are just a few types of defensive shrubs to consider planting for added protection at home.

If you live in a [shared housing complex](#), you may need to contact your homeowners association (HOA) before making any major changes or repairs to your home. Your HOA may be able to address the security concerns you have and make any needed improvements to your home and garden.
